Proposed itinerary

Day 1: Lhasa arrival [3650m]

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Welcome to Lhasa! Our Tibetan staff will warmly greet you and accompany you to your hotel. Lhasa is one of the highest cities in the world. We understand that the high altitude of Tibet can be challenging for some, so we recommend taking your time to acclimatise. Rest assured, we will provide all the necessary support to ensure your well-being. Remember to drink plenty of water and get plenty of rest to minimise any symptoms of altitude sickness. Get ready to embark on a once-in-a-lifetime adventure! *Overnight in Lhasa.*

Day 2: Lhasa sightseeing: Potala Palace & Jokhang Temple.

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At the scheduled time, we'll begin our tour by visiting the iconic Potala Palace. Built in the 17th century by the Fifth Dalai Lama, this magnificent palace offers breathtaking views of the city and houses the Dalai Lama's private quarters, numerous grand state rooms, and chapels. Afterwards, we'll visit the revered Jokhang Temple, founded in the 7th century by Songtsen Gampo and considered the holiest monastery in Tibet. Immerse yourself in the rich cultural heritage of this magical land as you stroll through the vibrant Barkhor Old Quarter, following pilgrims from across the Tibetan Plateau on a kora around the Jokhang Temple. Kora is a term used in Tibetan Buddhism that refers to the practice of circumambulating a sacred site, such as a temple, stupa, or mountain, as a way of showing devotion and accumulating merit. The practice involves walking clockwise around the site, often while reciting mantras, prayers, or other sacred texts. It is also believed to bring good fortune and blessings to those who undertake it. *Overnight in Lhasa.*

Day 3: Lhasa sightseeing: Drepung & Sera Monasteries.

Today we'll visit Drepung and Sera Monasteries. After breakfast, we'll venture to the outskirts of Lhasa to witness the grandeur of the Drepung Monastery, the largest in Tibet, which once housed 7000 monks. Along with the monasteries of Ganden and Sera, Drepung is one of the three great centres of Tibetan Buddhist education in the Gelugpa school, also known as the Yellow Hat Sect. Founded in the 15th century, it was the former residence of the Dalai Lama before the construction of the majestic Potala Palace. In the afternoon, you'll be mesmerised by the famous debates of the Sera Monastery, where monks engage with vibrant energy in intellectual discourse and challenge each other's understanding of Buddhist philosophy. It's a truly awe-inspiring experience not to be missed! *Overnight in Lhasa.*

Day 4: Ganden Monastery and Drak Yerpa Hermitage day trip [140Km]

We will begin the day with a visit to Ganden Monastery, located atop a hill in the Kyichu Valley, 50 km from Lhasa. It is the main seat of the Gelug Sect and was founded by Tsongkhapa in 1409. You may also do a kora around the monastery, offering peaceful views over the typical Tibetan landscape. After lunch, we'll head to the off-the-beaten-path site of Drak Yerpa, a complex of meditation caves and temples, one of the holiest pilgrimage sites since the 7th century. The visit involves about 2–3 hours of walking on a hillside. We'll then return to Lhasa for some free time. *Overnight in Lhasa.*

Day 5: Lhasa – Tsedang – Samye [210Km, 3575m]

Let the adventure begin! We will head southeast towards the Yarlung Valley, the cradle of Tibetan civilisation. Today's plan includes exploring the region where the ancient Tibetan kings unified Tibet in the 7th century. Our first stop will be at Tsedang, the fourth most important city in Tibet, where we will visit the Yumbulagang Palace, which dominates the valley from the top of a hill. Considered the first construction in Tibet, it resembles a medieval fortress. Next, we will visit the Samye Monastery (8th century), the first Buddhist monastery in Tibet. The monastery's unique architecture forms a gigantic mandala, following the structure of the universe according to Buddhist cosmology. If time permits, we will also visit the Temple of Traduk today. *Overnight in Samye.*

Day 6: Samye – Gyantse [280Km, 3980m]

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Get ready for an exciting day: we'll start driving west towards the Tsang region to ascend the Kampa-la Pass [4797m], where you'll witness the stunning Mt. Noi jin Kangsang [7206m] and the breathtaking turquoise waters of the holy Lake Yamdrok-Tso. An unreal sight that will leave you spellbound all the way to the Karo-la Pass [5050m], where you'll marvel at the glacier that majestically hugs the roadside. If the group's timing allows, you'll have the chance to walk to Jayang-tso Lake and see the Kyangyong Glacier. Our last stop of the day will be at Ralung Monastery, founded in the late 12th century, nestled in a remote and serene area surrounded by stunning mountain landscapes. Although less visited than other major monasteries in Tibet, it holds great importance in Tibetan Buddhism, particularly for the Drukpa Kagyu lineage in Bhutan. Finally, we'll arrive in the charming town of Gyantse before dinner. *Overnight in Gyantse.*

Day 7: Gyantse – Shigatse [102Km, 3840m]

Our first visit today will be to the Kumbum Stupa inside the Pelkor Chode Monastery, renowned for its exquisite Tibetan art paintings. From the top of the Kumbum, you'll also be treated to a magnificent view of the majestic Gyantse Dzong fortress overlooking the valley. On the way to Shigatse [3840m], Tibet's second-largest city, we'll make a short detour to visit the historic Shalu Monastery. Built in the 11th century, the monastery was partially destroyed by an earthquake in the 14th century and then rebuilt, resulting in a blend of architectural styles. Shalu Monastery boasts an impressive collection of Buddhist art and sculptures that are remarkably well preserved. It was a renowned centre of learning for various tantric practices and techniques, and some of these were described in Alexandra David-Néel's book *Magic and Mystery in Tibet*, which captivated readers worldwide. After lunch, we'll visit Tashilhunpo Monastery, built in the 15th century by the first Dalai Lama and currently the seat of the Panchen Lama. If time allows, take a kora around Tashilhunpo Monastery for sweeping views of the valley and the imposing Dzong. *Overnight in Shigatse.*

Day 8: Shigatse – Sakya [220Km, 4320m]

We will leave the main routes behind, following the Yarlung Tsangpo River to Phuntsokling Monastery [4010m], one of Tibet's hidden treasures. Originally belonging to the Jonang school, it flourished in the 16th–17th centuries under Jetsün Taranatha, who emphasised the Kalachakra Tantra. The monastery houses a monumental mural of the Buddha's life, designed by Taranatha around 1615–1630. After his death, having founded monasteries and promoted Buddhism in Mongolia, Taranatha's reincarnation was recognised by the Fifth Dalai Lama in the son of the Khalkha Mongol Khan. These incarnations became known as the Jetsün Dampa Hutuktu, spiritual leaders of the Gelug lineage in Mongolia. Although the Jonang tradition was later forcibly subsumed for political reasons, it persisted in secrecy in remote regions and endures to this day. The modern monastic complex is striking and photogenic, and from here, you can climb the hill to explore the ruins of the ancient dzong that once dominated the valley. In the afternoon, we'll arrive at our final destination for the day: the stunning Sakya Monastery, the principal seat of the Sakyapa Sect founded in 1073 and one of the four major schools of Tibetan Buddhism. Its powerful abbots governed Tibet during the whole of the 13th century until they were eclipsed by the rise of the Gelugpa Sect. With its unique Mongolian-style architecture, this monastery stands out from any other you've seen before. The lucky ones might even witness the sunset from atop the monastery walls, accompanied by the hypnotising sound of the monks playing their dungcheng, a traditional long Tibetan horn. *Overnight in Sakya.*

Day 9: Sakya – Rongbuk (Mt. Everest) [230Km, 5000m]

Another thrilling day! We'll reach one of the major highlights of our trip, near Mt. Everest North Base Camp [5200m]. The journey to Rongbuk involves crossing the high passes of Dong-la [4800m] and Gawu-la [5150m]. The Dong-la Pass offers the opportunity to see the little-known eastern face of Everest (Kangshung) and the Himalayas for the first time; and from the top of the Gawu-la you'll enjoy amazing views of several peaks, including Makalu, Lhotse, Cho Oyu, and Mount Everest. Rongbuk Monastery is located at the foot of Everest and is the highest monastery in the world. You'll spend the night at the tourist campsite located a few kilometres from the actual Everest Base Camp used by mountaineering expeditions, where you'll have direct views of Mt. Everest (Qomolangma). Since 2018, tourists have not been allowed to visit the EBC due to environmental protection, and there is now an eco-bus shuttle to access Rongbuk. *Overnight in Rongbuk.*

Day 10: Rongbuk – Kyirong [400Km, 2800m]

Today begins the end of your Tibetan journey through the most sacred Buddhist monasteries and mightiest mountains on earth, out of the barren Tibetan Plateau to the lush foothills of Nepal. For those eager to embrace an early start, witness the sunrise with breathtaking views of Everest's peak on the horizon [8848m]. After breakfast, we'll visit Rongbuk Monastery for a final view of Mt. Everest's North Face. Our journey then takes us northwest, traversing high mountain passes that reveal enchanting panoramas of the surrounding Himalayan peaks, including Cho Oyu and Shishapangma, as well as the pristine Lake Peikutso. From here, we turn south towards the jagged summits of the Langtang Himal. As we descend from the Roof of the World, the climate and landscape change dramatically, becoming milder, more humid, and lushly green. Since the closure of the Friendship Bridge border crossing at Zhangmu/Kodari after the 2015 Nepal earthquake, a new crossing for tourists has been opened at Kyirong, linking Tibet with Nepal's Langtang region. *Overnight in Kyirong.*

* **Alternative Border Crossings and Travel Contingencies:** *Depending on the condition of the access roads to the Kyirong/Rasuwagadhi border and the highway connecting to Kathmandu, it may be necessary to overnight in the town of Nyalam in order to cross into Nepal via the alternative Zhangmu/Kodari border point. In the worst-case scenario, if both border crossings are inaccessible due to temporary road closures, we will return to Shigatse and, on the following day, travel directly to Lhasa Airport to take an alternative flight to Nepal (please note that the cost of this flight is not included).*

Day 11: Tibet departure: Kyirong – Nepal border [20Km] – Kathmandu transfer [170Km]

After breakfast, your guide and driver will meet you at the hotel to transfer you to the Nepal border and assist you during Chinese customs clearance formalities. If you entered Tibet from Nepal with a Group Visa, remember to keep one photocopy of it when leaving Tibet. Once on the Nepalese side, our new Nepali driver will pick you up and transfer you by 4x4 to your final destination in Kathmandu (Thamel – Garden of Dreams). You can apply for your visa on the spot: USD 30/50/125 for a 15/30/90-day visa (more information is available on the Nepal Immigration website; online application receipt required). *End of our services.*

* **Important Notice About Road Conditions to Kathmandu:** *The road between Tibet and Kathmandu is in poor condition, particularly during the rainy season, which usually lasts from June to October (the monsoon season), depending on the year. Although infrastructure improvements are ongoing, the route remains fragile and subject to disruption. Floods or landslides may temporarily block the only road connecting Tibet and Kathmandu. In such cases, travellers may need to walk with their luggage (porters can usually be hired on site), wait for extended periods, cover additional expenses, miss flights, or, in extreme circumstances, return to Lhasa. We recommend ending the tour in Lhasa if you are not comfortable assuming these risks (see our Everest North Face Group Tour).*

Early arrival / Nepal extension available: take a relaxing day in Lhasa on your own! It's also possible to spend few more days visiting the Lhasa surroundings or even the holy Namtso lake in North Lhasa (250Km, 3 hours drive, each way). Consider exploring the Kathmandu Valley in Nepal just after departing Tibet. Please, contact us for further information about any available extension of your trip.

- Day 07** Gyantse–Shigatse [90Km, 3840m]: Pelkor Chode, Shalu and Tashilhunpo Monasteries.
- Day 08** Shigatse–Sakya [145Km, 4320m]: Phuntsokling & Sakya Monasteries.
- Day 09** Sakya–Rongbuk (Everest) [230Km, 5000m]: Qomolangma National Park, Rongbuk Monastery.
- Day 10** Rongbuk–Kyirong [400Km, 2800m]: Cho Oyu, Shishapangma & Peiku-tso lake viewpoints.
- Day 11** Tibet departure: Kyirong – Nepal Border [25Km] – Transfer to Kathmandu included [170Km]
